

Wilson Medical Exchange Memorandum of Understanding

CONNECT partners directly with universities, university students or professionals to provide a three-week exchange to the U.S. During an exchange, participants will shadow medical professionals in hospitals and clinics to gain a better understanding of the US medical system, hopefully in the participant's area of interest. They will live with individual host families to experience daily life and culture in an American home. In addition, there may be opportunities to visit a medical school and local tourist attractions and participate in English discussion groups regarding medical practices.

Purpose

With the Wilson Medical Exchange, we hope to compliment the Chinese medical universities by providing practical experience through job shadowing in an environment that expands the participants' global understanding, promotes integrity and virtue, and enhances their English communicative skills.

We hope the Wilson Medical Exchange will lead to communities of medical professionals throughout China that have compassion for the sick and work to advance virtuous practices that value life.

Impact

For three weeks, the participants will be in a life-transforming environment through home stays with American families who will love with truth and grace, and for two of those weeks the participants will job shadow in a workplace where these values can be reinforced in a professional setting.

The essential element of the life-transforming environment is love. We want the participants surrounded by families and professionals who sincerely care about them, wish to see them succeed, and are willing to sacrificially serve them in the home and workplace.

Each participant is placed in homes for their entire stay in the U.S., for it is in the home that they experience authentic American culture and witness firsthand the application of the values professed by the hosts.

The majority of the participants' time is spent in various workplaces observing and interacting with professionals. Gaining insight into the professional's line of work and firsthand experience in the workplace are the focal points of the WME Exchange. This is an exchange program and should not be considered an internship or practicum for course credit.

Goals

The goal is for personal and professional growth. Professionally, we want the participants to grow in two areas: their gifting and vision.

Gifting: Most WME participants, despite being locked into a major, do not know what specialty they want to pursue upon graduation. Exposure to people working in a variety of specialties that might interest the participants will help them determine if they are gifted in the demands of that career. Many Chinese will base their career choice solely on highest salary or the easiest to enter. We want them to realize they will be much happier choosing a career that best suits their gifts.

Vision: We also want the participants to have a vision for their career choice that is beyond a personal pursuit of wealth and status. We want them to realize that professionals have a higher calling to be excellent at their work and serve others. They are not just working a job; they are impacting those around them. This changes the way they approach their work and those they interact with daily. Professionals should also be role models of integrity and not succumb to common pressures of bribery and dishonesty. This requires an individual to center his thinking and decision-making on a system of values, which has a high regard for what is good and right.

Additionally, we want the participants to leave the U.S. more confident in their ability to communicate in English, grow in their understanding of American culture and broaden their worldview. We also want them to laugh a lot and enjoy themselves, their peers and their American friends.

Team

To successfully achieve the goals of the Wilson Medical Exchange, each U.S. partner needs a team. A team should consist of a project coordinator, a host family coordinator, a professional experience coordinator and a transportation coordinator. The team model should look very similar to short-term, overseas team, but instead of flying to another country, the team stays in the U.S. to serve the Chinese program participants.

Beyond the core team are a host of volunteers who help out the coordinators, provide transportation, meals, hosting, entertaining, mentoring and discussion leaders. Typically, it takes around 30 volunteers to adequately provide a WME project for four participants.

Participants

The Wilson Medical Exchange targets undergraduate and post-graduate Chinese university students from various medical fields who are proficient in English. Though freshmen could participate, typically the more mature a student is the better the experience.

Our program fee is roughly \$3,100 to participate in the exchange, which they understand will place them in American homes and workplaces for exposure to professional careers and western culture. This cost doesn't include airfare, visas or lunches during job shadowing. Because of your team's generosity, we are able to keep the cost lower for the participants. Thank you!

Responsibilities of Connect

Our responsibilities include:

- Working with our partners to promote the exchange and ensure the participants' preparedness for the U.S.
- Selecting qualified participants
- Provide cultural training for participants before leaving China
- Provide advanced financing for our U.S. partners for group program expenses incurred (ie. orientation, welcome/farewell banquets, group excursions/entertainment, evening discussion group snacks, group transportation). Financing is issued via Blue Bridge International, LLC "BBI" (CONNECT's US-based, parent company)

Responsibilities of the U.S. Partner

The main responsibilities of the U.S. Partner include:

- Ensuring the participants' safety and care from when they land in the U.S. until they leave the U.S.
- Providing host families for the participants to live with for the full length of the exchange
- Arrange and manage the participants' U.S. schedule:
 - Orientation -- half a day
 - Welcome Banquet -- once
 - Language Training -- one to two days
 - Local university and worksite tours -- one to two days
 - Professional experiences in workplaces -- most weekdays
 - Volunteer work -- one to two days
 - Reflection groups/discussion groups -- twice a week
 - Cultural activities -- weekly
 - China presentation event -- once
 - Farewell banquet -- once

Host Families (Also view “Host Family Guidelines and Expectations”)

Participants will live with families that love through grace and truth.

Most participants are an only child and so enjoy joining a family with other children. Families with children are not a program requirement, but such placements are worth prioritizing.

If necessary, multiple participants can be placed together in one home, two to a room, if the accommodations are comfortable and each participant has his/her own bed.

Host families are expected to provide their guests with breakfast and dinner for each day the participant is at their home.

Weekends are a special opportunity for the host families to spend extra time getting to know their participant and introducing them to American life. Cultural activities such as attending church, visiting museums, parks or concerts, going to the movies, watching a sporting event or spending a day at the lake are all encouraged. In the past, the participants' favorite activity was visiting a farm, on which they rode 4-wheelers and shot rifles. The meals and other costs incurred by the host families that aren't for a project-wide event are viewed as a gift to the participants; therefore, financial compensation for time or money spent on the participants by the host families is not available.

The U.S. partner needs to be prepared to immediately relocate the participants to a different home if circumstances require such intervention.

Professional Experience Opportunities (Also view “Job Shadowing: Guidelines and Expectations”)

Sometimes a variety of professional experiences is better. Not only does this broad exposure help the participants, it also helps the program coordinators by giving them more options from which to choose.

When the participants are selected to the program, they provide a list of their medical fields of interest. Their shadowing opportunities should include a least one of their requested fields. Popular medical fields include: Gastrointestinal, Maxillofacial Surgery, ENT, family practice, OB-GYN, and ER to name a few.

Observing surgeries is an enjoyable experience, so hopefully several can be arranged for them. However, most participants do not have high enough English levels to follow what's happening and surgeons are unable to take time out for explanations, so the majority of their time is best spent visiting patients with the medical professionals.

Medical professionals' schedules can be difficult to work around given their abnormal hours and administrative work. Providing a week's worth of shadowing for a participant will most likely require splitting his or her time between three different doctors with a back-up plan for sudden cancellations.

Due to jet lag and the fatigue of using a second language constantly, the participants' shadowing/career training schedules should conclude between two and three o'clock in the afternoon. Extra time at home helps them rest, reflect on what they have experienced and have energy of any evening discussion groups or activities.

WME Events

Orientation

When the participants arrive, they need an orientation time to learn a bit about the city and what to expect for the next three weeks and what is expected of them.

Welcoming and Farewell Banquets

Culturally, banquets are used in China as a means of establishing and celebrating relationship. A welcoming banquet can be designed to introduce participants to some of the professionals they will be interacting with in their career training experience and cast a vision for ways in which the professionals hope to have an impact on the participants' gifts and visions. Similarly, a farewell banquet celebrates the relationships that have been formed, lessons learned and gives the professionals one last chance to bestow their guests with honor before returning to China.

Workplace and University Campus Tours

Participants should be given a chance to visit their career training workplaces and a university campus if there is one locally. While touring may seem boring to Westerners, it is a regular Chinese activity filled with much photo taking.

CPR and Professional English Training

If possible, we'd like the participants to spend a couple of days working on their English skills before entering their workplaces. Some of that comes from just being immersed in an English-speaking environment. Separately, some type of ESL training that takes into consideration the various job shadowing the participants will experience has been provided by local partners for previous projects.

Volunteer Experience

Spending some time volunteering at a food bank, homeless shelter, crisis pregnancy center, low-income health clinic, or elderly care facility helps to balance the participants' exposure to the wealth that America portrays while increasing their vision for ways of helping the poor.

Discussion Groups

Once or twice a week the participants will meet together with a local professional to process their experiences, discuss the types of careers they are interested in pursuing after graduation, and talk about tackling the most pressing problems in their professional communities. It's during this time that the participants are challenged to consider the values necessary for true professional success and talk about the value-based problems facing the professional communities in their own culture.

China Presentation Event

We'd like to give the Chinese participants a chance to be the teachers by arranging an evening for them to present their life and culture to the friends they have made in the U.S.

**Participants will debrief with CONNECT representatives after they return to China, the results of which will be shared with your team. We would like them to leave the U.S. with the most positive mindset, without having been asked to consider what could have been better until they are back in China.

Cultural Experiences

We want the participants to experience American life. The host families can provide many of these opportunities themselves by involving them in family activities from fun (watching movies) to mundane (grocery shopping), but the U.S. partner should plan a few group activities throughout the exchange.

For example:

- A trip to a nearby attraction or major city
- A seasonal sporting event: basketball, baseball, football or hockey
- A local university campus event

Finances

Each U.S. partner will be sent program funds of \$400/participant in advance of the program.

- \$400/participant is budgeted for group program expenses incurred (ie. orientation, welcome/farewell banquets, group excursions/entertainment, evening discussion group snacks, group transportation, materials, etc.). ***Receipts necessary**

Process of funds, US partners must:

1. Sign a Program Finance Agreement with BBI.

Program advancements will be made via wire transfer or check within two weeks of receiving a scanned copy of the signed Program Finance Agreement.

Appendix A (Team Roles)

Project Coordinator

Every successful team needs a team leader to pull together all the resources necessary to accomplish its objectives and to troubleshoot when problems arise. The project coordinator would fulfill this role by recruiting all of the other coordinators, casting the vision for the Wilson Medical Exchange, leading the project preparation period, establishing clear lines of communication with team members and with their CONNECT representative, and providing oversight to the actual project when the participants are in the U.S. As one can imagine, this role requires many hours of labor and is probably best suited for someone that is gifted in coordinating.

Host Family Coordinator

The Wilson Medical Exchange is very unique from other types of exchange programs offered to Chinese in that participants stay with host families. Our Chinese partners also recognize this as a highly attractive aspect of the program. Thus, the host family coordinator has an important role of recruiting willing host families and matching the participants with the appropriate families. The host family coordinator is responsible for all communications with the host families, passing along host family information to the project coordinator and dealing with any participant/host family issues that may arise during the project.

Career Training Coordinator

Providing opportunities for WME participants to develop professional skills and interact with professionals in their area of interest is a vital element of the exchange program. Though not always possible, our goal is to provide a large variety of opportunities for the participants to choose from so that they can select one they are interested in. It is the career training coordinator's role to find these opportunities by promoting the WME vision through their network of Christian professionals. Once participating professionals prepare descriptions of their career training opportunities, the coordinator should pass these along to the project coordinator. This role also has the responsibility to recruit professionals to lead the weekly discussion groups. Once the project is underway, the career training coordinator should follow-up with the companies/professionals to ensure the participants are receiving a quality experience.

Transportation Coordinator

Transporting the participants to and from work is a worthy challenge for the most gifted coordinator. Host families are often unavailable to provide all the necessary transportation needed as they may be working or preoccupied with family responsibilities. Besides, they are already greatly contributing to the program. Some mornings the participants will need to arrive early to their workplace, and it is common to have multiple transportation needs throughout the day for just one participant. The transportation coordinator would need to recruit a pool of volunteers willing to meet the transportation needs, create a transportation schedule, and coordinate with the transportation volunteers and the host families to ensure the transportation needs are met.
